### **A Word On Worship**

I have deeply experienced the truth of 1 Corinthians 12:7 in worship, “To each has been given a gift of the Spirit for the good of all.” It takes dozens of people to put on any of the worship services we have here at Vista. We have ushers, liturgists, choir members, organists/piano players, choir and bell choir directors and ringers. We have greeters, welcoming booth people, and Stephen ministers. We have sound booth operators and video slide show creators. We have about 6 people behind the scenes week after week recruiting these people and encouraging them in their tasks. For our special services we have people setting up, taking down, cleaning up, and locking up. For Holy Communion, we have a person, who for the last 9 years has recruited people month after month year after year to serve us this holy meal. We have about a dozen servers and hosts now including our Stephen ministers. (And we need a few more:)

All of this is the “Liturgy”, which means “the work of the people”! We often think the “liturgy” is simply the order of worship in our bulletins, but as you see it goes far beyond that. Just look in any Sunday bulletin and see all the people who work so hard every week to see that our worship touches souls, and glorifies God. Each and every person has a different gift that they present to God in their service. It is interesting to note too that the words “service” and “worship” are interchangeable. As the laity of the church “serve” they “worship”.

Now another thing I believe and have practiced is that Pastors are not the only ones who have the gift of preaching. Preaching is often a form of teaching and about 2/3rds of our congregation has that gift, which is why I want to share the lime light with many of them who are so gifted and called. I am recruiting people to help lead the “Children’s Moments” or “Young People’s Time” in worship including some of the young people themselves. Through the years I have found one of the best ways to encourage young people to enter the ordained ministry is to directly involve them in the leadership of worship and the church. So, coming soon are new voices and people to lead this time during our worship.

Thank you for your part in worship!! I actually, in just this short article, could not list all the people involved in just one single worship service. But each one, doing his or her part contribute to the whole and Glory of God!!!

## Walking Sticks

Well, since Henry Ford came on the scene, the walking stick went in the back seat to be used only in the event of flat tire or radiator boil over. These things were commonplace before power steering and AC. Eventually the round trip by car moved from hopeful outcome to downright expectation. Soon cars will drive themselves and we will have even more "free time". Probably gain more weight too.

Once, in life, walking was how people got from place to place. Imagine that. And while walking the simple necessities of comfort were carried in an over the shoulder sack. I'm sure diets crazes were not so popular back then. I mean why diet if you are sure to exercise. Walking does give freedom to the mind. It is great exercise, especially uphill. When one drives a 250 horsepower car, a five percent grade is hardly noticeable. Why it isn't even there. Park the car and walk up the same hill. Now you know the meaning of immediate surroundings. Walking down the same hill is even more fun especially if you bought your shoes for style and not function.

The picture doesn't show a hat but I'll bet there is one somewhere.

Every new person joining Vista de la Montana church is given a walking stick. This tradition has been going on for several years, continuously. It is purely symbolic. I can't imagine any one actually needing it in our modern world. Of all the things to load in the car to drive across town, a walking stick is about last choice. Still, symbols are important. Joining a new church is to begin a new spiritual journey. On this journey there will be rocky places, uneven ground, moments of uncertainty. Symbolically, a traveler does need a third foot for balance and probe to test the edges of our path. It is to capture this symbolism walking sticks are given.

The sticks at Vista are made from Yucca stalks and if these are not available the stalk of desert spoon. The search for a stand of these plants is much of the fun. This gets you out of town and off the road. A great way to spend a few hours. Hint, wear sturdy shoes, carry water and.... you guessed it, have a walking stick. I'm sure you are aware yucca is a lower desert plant and desert spoon is usually found above 3500'. So from Vista go uphill for spoon and down hill for yucca. Simple huh? In practice it isn't quite so simple. So out of doors you go and the search is on. Basically you take what mother nature offers on a first appearance basis.

I'd much rather work with Yucca. There are hardly any splinters. However, there are many crooked ones to each straight stalk. Even notice the stalks presented at Vista are straight? This isn't by accident. Desert spoon are almost always straight and tall. They look ideal yet the splinters coming off the stalk are almost threatening. Even after sanding the splinters continue popping up and are a nuisance. Consider two or three applications of varathane clear coat ( a varnish substance). This glues the splinters down and on the upside makes a great looking stick. The stained top is just for fun.

A thought on yucca stalk sticks, kept indoors and away from weather, these will last for years. Many years even. Remember this is a flower stalk and mother nature intended her stalk to hold up the flowering top for a month only. The flowering top probably weighs 15 pounds, plenty for a flower. Factor in the wind and rain and the stalk must be light and strong. And they are, very light and very strong. Not like hickory or elm but strong enough for the purpose intended. Mom wins again.

Strong enough and light enough these make a first class staff, more so if you would stop by Walgreen's and buy a rubber cane tip for the bottom. If you want a shorter stick, maybe cane length, cut from the bottom. Remember when cutting if you are three inches to long the cane will give good service. If it is 1/2 inch short you throw it away. Measure twice, cut once. I love to make these sticks but Pastor Fred and Membership - Evangelism are doing such a fine job of bringing in new members I need help. No I'm not recruiting. I am thanking Bob Sherman and Don August for their help in all phases of the manufacture of the Vista Walking Sticks. It is our joy to do this. It is a delight to the eye and soul to experience the new members with their sticks looking out over their new church members and seeing them on the start of their symbolic spiritual journey.

As Christians we reflect on images especially the image of our Savior. A person does not have to look through very many images of Jesus to find one wherein He is holding a walking stick. Now I will say, His stick is often shown as 4 inches diameter and 7 feet long and a football player couldn't carry it 30 rod. It's more of a caber than a stick. But I'll leave that alone. Maybe its a play on "walk softly and carry a BIG stick"? Moses is shown with a stick. In another scripture Moses is asked why he carries a stick. He answers, I tend sheep, guide on my path and I use it for "other things". For sure a multipurpose tool, this walking stick.

I think we are on to something here, I know no where else having such a welcome ceremony. Ours is unique. We should do, here and there, sensibly speaking what others do not as it makes us unique and gives others reason to step inside Vista de la Montana and seek comfort and guidance. For sure, we are up to this.

### **Echoes Report for Vista's sister church Fuente de Vida (Fountain of Life) Agua Prieta, Mexico**

Here is an update of my phone conversation with pastor Gela on 2-17-16. She shared the following with me.

- 1) Pastor Gela wants to extend her gratitude to the good folks at Vista for all your great help to the ministry of her church and also a very special thanks for the financial aid towards the cost of a new vehicle to use in her ministry. Her old van just finally gave out and it was way beyond practicality to repair it with over 260,000 miles on it.
- 2) The church has grown to the point where it is now necessary to conduct 2 services each Sunday morning. One at 10:00 AM and another at 12:30 PM. The 1st is completely full and the second is almost reached full seating too. God is truly blessing their ministry.
- 3) The walls are going up on the Rojas children's house, and by April they hope to be able to put the roof on. The kids are so excited that by summer they will move into their own new concrete block home. (Jim Bless has given us a sleeper sofa for their new home). There will be 7 people moving into the house. Older brother Manuel his wife and baby and 4 of the younger brothers and sisters. (Their Mother Graciela was killed in the crossfire of a Drug Cartel shootout in Cananea some years ago, leaving behind her 8 children. The church family at Fuente de Vida has seen to their care.)
- 4) The Children's Christian Education director Martha, started 2 weeks ago, a tutoring class in the old trailer church building. This after school program is for children who are having a difficult time with their studies at the local public school. The principal is very supportive of this special learning support for these failing students and has sent 45 children so far to receive assistance at these free classes on the church grounds. There are so

many children from all over Mexico that have come to the Border with their families, and their former education opportunities, in many cases, have been very poor. So this additional help is invaluable for them to be able to catch up. The college students that Vista is supporting with scholarships are assisting with the tutoring as part of their pay back for their scholarships. Martha works as a teacher at the Public School from 8:00AM to 1:00PM all week before rushing over to the church to set up for the special classes from 2:00 PM to 4:00 PM, Mon. Wed. & Fri.

Vista has had the challenge from our Annual Conference for the last 13 years to assist with an Economic Advancement program for this Mission Project.

After a number of various ideas we have placed our main emphasis on the education of the youth of this poor neighborhood and we are seeing the great results of this commitment. Thank you so much for all that you dedicated folk at Vista do to support this program.

## **TUCSON HOSPITALITY INN**

For the benefit of our new members, Tucson Hospitality Inn (or THI) is one of our mission projects that Vista supports. It is a six room house in the heart of Tucson on Edison Street that is a hospital hospitality house for patients and their family members and/or caregivers who come from out of town, out of the state, or out of the country to have medical treatment. Patients are being treated for cancer, awaiting transplants or recovering from them, or are trauma victims. Guests stay anywhere from a few days to months. Guests are charged \$35-\$55 a night depending on whether they share a bath or have a private bath. There is also a scholarship program to help those who need financial assistance with their stay. This is an essentially a one-man operation by Lou Tompkins, CEO and Manager. He provides a continental breakfast plus emergency food items in the Inn's pantry. These include soups, canned pasta, cereal, and canned fruit, plus coffee and tea are always on hand.

THI is 501 (c) (3) Qualifying Charitable Non-Profit Organization and is a member of the Arizona 211 program. This means individuals can donate up to \$200 and couples can donate up to \$400 to the Inn and receive dollar for dollar state tax credit. But every dollar is tax deductible whether the donor lives in state or out of state.

We had a very successful pantry food and linen drive this fall and the donations still kept coming in December, January, and early February. Now the totals donated are 52 cans of pasta, 87 cans of soup, 56 cans of fruit, 10 cans of vegetables, 2 canned meat products, 32 servings of cereal, 28 miscellaneous food items, 39 bath towels, 32 hand towels, and 17 washcloths. That's a total of 265 food items and 88 linen items! Thanks so much!!!

Staying at the Inn during the last four weeks as of this writing mid February are: Nadia from Cairo, Egypt. She is having more facial surgery; Linda from Louisville, Kentucky. Her daughter Alexia had a double lung transplant; Sarah with her husband from Las Vegas. She is 80 years old with leukemia and they will be at the Inn until March while she gets treatment; Steven from California. He has throat cancer and has had surgery.

There were some very generous monetary donations given in December and January. Early February we were able to send the Inn \$850 to help. Lou and I appreciate your generosity with all you have given. Know that each and every dollar, every food item, and every piece of linen go to helping the guests at the Inn. Please keep the Inn, its guests, and Lou in your prayers.

## COMMUNION STEWARDS NEEDED!

Mary Lou Young and Carol Curtis are our faithful communion stewards and we appreciate their faithful service. However, occasionally one or both of them are out of town or otherwise unavailable. What we need are at least TWO individuals or couples who would be willing to substitute if needed. What do the Communion Stewards do? On a monthly basis they prepare the elements for use by the communion servers (putting pieces of bread on plates and pouring the juice into the chalices). Next, they place the elements on the altar before church and take them away after church. Lastly, the plates and the chalices must be washed, dried, and placed in the appropriate cupboards in the kitchen. All of this takes about ten or fifteen minutes each on a Sunday morning once a month. Sometimes extra Communion opportunities occur (such as Christmas Eve, Ash Wednesday, etc.) when stewards are also needed. The stewards may serve Communion, but are not required to do so. We had a solid beginning to the New Year. The first quarter is very important since our income is greatest when all of our residents are in AZ – the 4th and 1st quarters. Our expenses are quite static each month, but income varies greatly based on the time of the year. We met our Expense Budget in January and exceeded the Income Budget. Net Income, after Mortgage and Contingency Fund transfers was \$4,059. Expenses are higher than most other months in January due to several payments we make 2 - 4 times a year, such as Insurance and some of our utilities. This year we also had an extra payroll period. Our Mortgage has been reduced to \$137,453. Attendance was even with last year. Financial reports are available in the Church Office. 
